Each week, you need to choose one of these activities to complete and hand in on Wednesday in your homework book. Make sure you choose a

range of activities (some from each box) during the term.



English Activities:

- Read some animal fact files and talk about how non fiction writing is different to fiction. There are some lovely fact files here: <u>Wildlife Advice |</u> <u>Tiggywinkles (sttiggywinkles.org.uk)</u>
- Choose your favourite animal. Can you write a
 brief description of it so that someone could
 guess what it is? Remember to use adjectives and
 joining words (conjunctions such as and, because,
 or).
- Pretend you are a wild animal for a day. What would you eat? Where would you sleep? Would you be hiding from a predator or would you be the predator? Write a short diary as if you are the animal.

Maths Activities:

- Create a poster to investigate either the 2 and 3 x tables or the 5 and 10 x tables.
 Can you spot any patterns or similarities between them?
- You might need some help for this one... With a grown up, measure the height of as many members of your family as possible. You could measure them in cm, m, or use items such as blocks to see how tall they are. Once you have the measurements, why not make a bar chart to represent the data you collected? This can then be shown to your class.
- Have a go at making your own word problems for addition and subtraction.
 For example, Miss Phillips has 10 sweets,
 Miss Tolley has 7. How many do they have altogether?



Topic Activities:

- Research how wild animals, such as hedgehogs, are helped at Tiggywinkles Sanctuary near Thame. Perhaps pay them a visit!
- Carry out a wild bird count in your own garden or in a local park. Can you identify the birds?
- Can you label a picture of the human body with the names of 5 different bones?
- Draw a picture of your favourite animal or bird and describe its fur, skin, feathers scales or other features.
- Research one of the 7 continents and write a factfile about it.
